Textile Industry in Vidarbha

271. Shri Hukam Chang Kachhavaiya:

Will the Minister of Commerce be pleased to state:

- (a) whether it is a fact that the restriction on the movement of cotton in Nagpur has severely affected the Textile Industry in Vidarbha; and
- (b) if so, the arrangements make by Government to keep the mills running?

The Deputy Minister in the Ministry of Commerce (Shri Shafi Qureshi):
(a) and (b). Restrictions on movement of Cotton have not affected the textile industry in Vidarbha adversely. In fact, arrangements exist for the issue of movement-permits to enable cotton textile mills to purchase and move cotton to the mills, and for requisitioning, wherever feasible, to help the mills to secure their requirements of cotton at the appropriate ceiling prices.
