## ORAL ANSWERS TO QUESTIONS Sugar Mills

\*288. Shri D. C. Sharma†: Shri Jhulan Sinha:

Will the Minister of Food and Agriculture be pleased to state:

- (a) what is the total unused capacity in the sugar mills at present;
- (b) what steps Government have taken to enable the sugar mills to employ their unused capacity?

The Minister of Co-operation (Dr. P. S. Desmukh): (a) and (b) Apart from a few small uneconomic factories whose plants are worn out there are 6 factories with production capacity of about 30,000 tons of sugar per year which are not working. The reasons for this and whatever steps it has been possible to take so far to bring any of these factories into production are indicated in the statement placed on the Table of the Lok Sabha [See Appendix I, annexure No 87]

- Shri D. C. Sharma: May I know the number of factories lying idle, or whose capacity is not being fully used, besides those whose names have been given in the statement?
- Dr. P. S. Deshmukh: As has been pointed out, there are altogether 16 factories which are lying idle Ten of them are such whose machines are

worn out and it would be no use rehabilitating them. There are only six factories which have been mentioned in the statement and the causes are also indicated

Dr. Ram Subhag Singh May I know since when those 16 factories are lying idle, and whether sugarcane is produced in the areas where those factories are situated?

Dr. P. S. Deshmukh: There are various dates from which these factories have been lying idle. As would be seen even from the statement, some have been not in use from 1943-44, some from 1950-51 and so on The remaining ten factories are practically uneconomical and their machines are also worn out

Shri Heda: Is it not a fact that while in certain areas factories are lying idle in certain other areas sugarcane is grown more than what the factories in those areas can consume, and the scheme of the Government was to transfer the factories from deficit areas to sugarcane surplus areas, if so, may I know what steps are being taken so that these six or seven factories may be transferred to the sugarcane surplus areas?

The Minister of Food and Agriculture (Shri A. P. Jain): The Sugar Development Council considered the whole question. It invited the factory owners to indicate whether their factory was unsuitably situated and, if it was so, whether they would like to have it shifted. We received a number of applications. All those applications have been dealt with and there is no pending application where any factory owner has applied for shifting his factory from one place to another.

Shri Viswanatha Reddy: Most of the unused capacity of sugar factories is to be found in North India, because North India is not so very suited for sugar industry Several expert committees have recommended for the migration of sugar industry to South India If it is so, may I know what steps the Government has taken in this direction?

Dr. F. S. Deshmakh: Some of the factories are situated in South India also Moreover, it would be realised by the House that the amount capacity unused is very small nowa-days It used to be far greater sometime back, but since there is improvement in sugarcane production a number of factories have found it economical to work and the capacity lying idle is only about 30,000 tons in a whole year

Shri A. P. Jain: It is only 3,000 tons

Shri Dasappa: In view of the fact that out of the many unused factories. which have been named here, six are unused for the last five or eight years due to disputes between partners and so on, will the Government be pleased to consider the evolving of some formula or procedure which they can take hold of these factories, and either put them to good use at the places where they are at present, or transfer them to places where they are needed more?

Shri A. P. Jain: In fact, the hon Member seems to forget that they are privately owned factories Most of them are uneconomic and they need expansion Expansion has been allowed but money has to be found by the owners of these factories In some cases they are under litigation or some other trouble For instance, one was under the custody of the Custodian of Evacuee Properties because some of the owners migrated to Pakistan and the factory was not working We have done everything that can possibly be done, but so long as private ownership exists we cannot compel them to use these sugar factories

Pandit D., N. Tiwary: May I know whether the Government proposes to pass a legislation by which they can take over the factories which are not being used due to disputes, or are uneconomic for the size of the plants, so that there will not be any national loss?

Shri A. P. Jain: The Government has no idea of taking over sugarcane factories which are running under a

Shri Tangamani: Of the six factories which are lying idle, Muruguppa Sugar Company is one with a crushing capacity of 100 tons a day May I know whether steps will be taken for the early re-opening of this factory instead of asking the owners to apply to the State Finance Corporation?

Shri A. P. Jain: After all, there are certain organisations through which finances can be provided. So far as this particular factory is concerned, it tried to expand its capacity to 400 tons but could not complete the project because of financial difficulties. It is for the factory to find the money, and the hon Member should not forget the fact that, while total amount of sugar produced is 20 lakh tons the capacity lying idle is only 3,000 tops

## Minor Ports in Andhra

\*289. Shri M. V. Krishnarao: Will the Minister of Transport and Communications be pleased to state

- (a) whether Government have any proposal for the development minor ports in Andhra Pradesh,
- (b) if so, the nature of the proposal and the decision taken thereon; and
  - (c) the names of ports?

The Minister of State in the Ministry of Transport and Communications (Shri Raj Bahadur): (a) to (c) The development of minor ports is primarily the responsibility of the State
