- (d) The matter being sub-judice. details of the incident cannot be given
- (e) A police picket has been posted in the colliery and the situation is now peaceful.

- (b) The Security Forces have further intensified their operations against the Naga hostiles.
- (c) The Government of India have been in touch with the Burmese authorities who have promised to render all possible help in dealing with the Naga hostiles based in Burma.

The Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister of External Affairs (Shri Sadath Ali Khan): (a) Yes.

(b) and (c). On Friday the 15th September, 1961 at about 10.20 P.M. a motor-car carrying 2 or 3 unknown persons was seen stopping in front of the Ambassador's residence and the crashing of two or three stones against the front door of the house was heard. Two glass doors were thus damaged. There was no crowd at the time of the incident and there was no demonstration. The Police and the Chief of Protocol were informed. Soon After, the Head of the Police arrived and and gave all assurance of protection. Police were posted both at the Chancery and the Embassy night and day for a week. The Chancery remained open during that period. The Foreign Office agreed to pay the bill for the

repairs of damage caused and expressed regrets for the attack.

Firing by Pakistanis on Jammu Border

(a) whether the Government of India have since considered the report submitted by the Committee of Experts to examine and recommend measures to ensure the maximum eco-

nomy and efficiency in the U.N. Secretariat; and

(b) if so, what are the final conclusions and the decisions arrived at?

The Deputy Minister of External Affairs (Shrimati Lakshmi Menon):

(a) and (b). The Report of the Committee of Experts broadly covers four issues: (i) Top Level of the Secretariat; (ii) Geographical Distribution of Staff; (iii) Economic and Social Activities; and (iv) Administrative and Budgetary Matters.

The Report is yet to be considered by the current Session of the General Assembly and the final views of the Government of India will need to take account of developments there. Broadly, however, the views of the Government of India on these issues are as under.

- (i) Top level of the Secretariat.—The Government of India are in favour of a Secretariat which can function effectively and which also takes into account the different currents of opinion in the world.
- (ii) Geographical Distribution.—The Government of India are generally in agreement with the recommendations made by the majority of the Members of the Committee, which suggest methods of ensuring equitable geographical distribution on the basis of population and contribution to the budget.
- (iii) Economic and Social Activities .- The Government of India are in agreement in principle with the recommendation made by the majority of the Members of the Committee that there should be decentralisation of economic and social activities transferring their activities and operation from U.N. headquarters to regional Economic Commissions. The question of the modalities of such transfer will, however, need further consideration.
- (iv) Administrative and Budgetary Matters.—These relate to division of
