INTERNATIONAL AIR LINES

*477. Shri Velayndhan: Will the Minister of Communications be pleased to state:

(a) whether any increases in fares has taken place in the International air lines recently; and

(b) if so, whether it has affected the Indian air lines too?

The Deputy Minister of Communications (Shri Raj Bahadur): (a) Yes, on certain sectors.

(b) Air fares on certain sectors of international services operated by Indian air lines have also increased.

Shri Velayudhan: May I know, Sir, whether there is any mutual agreement regarding this fare increase between the foreign companies and the Indian companies?

Shri Raj Bahadur: These are always considered by the International Air Transport Board.

Shri Velayadhan: May I know, Sir, how far the air fare in India is increased on the basis of the decision of that body? What percentage of increase?

Shri Raj Bahadur: It is difficult to calculate the percentage. I have got a statement regarding changes in fares and if my hon. friend refers to any particular route, I shall try to give him the fare for the same.

Shri K. K. Basu: Has the Government any say in the increase of these Air Line fares?

Shri Raj Bahadur: There is a body known as the Air Transport Licensing Board which considers these increases of fares, and, of course, Government is represented on that Board.

Shri N. Sreekantan Nair: What is the increase in fare from Delhi to Ernakulam?

Shri B. S. Murthy: What factors are taken into consideration by that Board in increasing the fares?

Shri Raj Bahadur: The main criteria are, the cost of operation, the characteristics of the route, the type of aircraft used, with its capacity, speed, comfort and other economic and competitive factors.

EXPERIMENTAL FARMS

*479. Shri Chinaria: (a) Will the Minister of Food and Agriculture be pleased to state how many experimental farms under the Central Government are there in India?

(b) Have they any co-ordinated plan of research and experiments?

The Deputy Minister of Food and Agriculture (Shri M. V. Krishnappa):

(a) There are twenty-two experimental farms under the control of 9 research Institutes and Commodity Committees. There are in addition 5 farms for the production of fodder for cattle belonging to two Veterinary and Dairy research Institutes.

(b) Yes. The co-ordination of schemes of research i_S achieved by the Board of Research of the Indian Council of Agricultural Research.

Shri Chinaria: May I know, Sir, what was the acreage under food crops and tonnage of foodgrains in 1946-47 and what were the same in 1951-52? What increase in area. . . .

Mr. Speaker: I am afraid it will be difficult for the House to follow. Let the first part of the question be answered.

Shri Chinaria: I wanted to know Sir. what was the increase in produce and area during this period and what percentage of increase was due to this research? Mr. Speaker: I think it will be better if he puts a separate question for the details.

Shri M. V. Krishnappa: Y our Minister has given it, Sir. Yesterday

Shri Chinaria: May I know, what was the date from which the Grow More Food Campaign was put on a war footing and what time did it take the Indian Council of Agri-cultural Research to get at the idea that dissemination of agricultural in-

Shri A. M. Thomas: May I know. Sir, whether the cost of production in these farms forms any basis for the fixation of prices by Government? Shri M. V. Krishnappa: I want notice for that.

The Minister of Food and Agriculture (Shri Kidwai): They are experimental farms and they are not expected to be self-supporting.

Pandit Munishwar Datt Upadhyay: What is the total expenditure on them?

Shri Kidwal: These experimental farms are attached to different institutions and if the hon. Member wants Shri Kidwal: information about any, it can be given.

Shri B. N. Misra: May we know whether the experiment carried out in these farms have in any way affected the growing of crops in our country? Shri B. N. Misra:

Shri Kidwal: They are expected to do so.

FAMINE CODE

*480. Shri Tushar Chatterjea: Will the Minister of Food and Agriculture be pleased to state:

(a) what steps the Government of India have taken to implement the statement made by the Minister of Food on the 17th September, 1952 that the Famine Code should be amended to suit the present chronic famine conditions of the country;

(b) whether any emergency measure has been taken or is proposed to be taken to meet the needs of the situa-tion till the Famine Code is not finally amended; and

(c) whether the Government of India have collected detailed facts re-

garding the number and percentage of people deserving the benefit of the Famme Code and if so, what are the detailed facts?

The Deputy Minister of Food and Agriculture (Shri M. V. Krishnappa):
(a) to (c). Every State has a separate Famine Code of its own and the exestion of amending these Codes is a State subject and not a Central subject.
