ORAL ANSWERS TO QUESTIONS.

SAMPLE SURVEY OF UNEMPLOYMENT

\*501. Shri S. N. Das: Will the Minister of Planning be pleased to state:

- (a) whether progress has been made in the work of Sample Survey of un- ←mp'oyment undertaken at different places in the country;
  - (b) if so, what; and
- (c) what is the number of persons that have been engaged to carry out this work in different fields?

The Minister of Planning and Irrigation and Power (Shri Nanda): (a) Yes.

- (b) The field survey work i.e. the collection of preliminary data in the prescribed schedules, entrusted to this Directorate, was conducted in different places and has since been completed. The filled-in-schedules have been sent to the Indian Statistical Institute, Calcutta for analysis and compilation of the results of the survey.
- (c) A total number of 204 investigators of this Directorate were put on this job. Their work was supervised by the Superintendents, who are usually assisted by Assistant 550 P.S.D.

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Superintendents and Inspectors, working under them.

Shri S. M. Das: May I know, Sir, whether the persons appointed for this work were recruited specially for this purpose or they were taken from some department?

Shri Nanda: Whatever the source, they were properly trained and prepared for this work

Shri S. N. Das: May I know, Sir, whether any Indian expert was associated with this work or whether it was carried on by officials?

Shri Nanda: It was under expert direction that the whole of this work was done

Sarimati Renu Chakravarity: May I know, Sir, from the first results that have been received which category of classes has the highest percentage of unemployment in the area surveyed in West Bengal?

Shri Nanda: I did not follow the question.

Mr. Speaker: Which class has the highest percentage of unemployment so far as the survey is concerned?

Shri Nanda: The results have not been tabulated yet.

Shri T. K. Chaudhuri: Is there any proposal to compute the total volume of unemoloyment in the country from the available data—census reports, sample surveys etc.?

Shri Nanda: Yes, a number of inquiries and surveys are in progress and as soon as the results are available, a general assessment will be made.

Shri S. N. Mishra: May I know, Sir, whether any survey of the rural employment situation has also been undertaken?

**Shri Nanda:** Yes, Sir. The seventh round of the National sample survey includes a survey of rural unemployment also.

## INDO PAKISTAN NEGOTIATIONS

\*502. Shri S. N. Das: Will the Prime Minister be pleased to state:

- (a) whether negotiations with the Government of Pakistan with regard to exchange of enclaves, border trade, freedom of movement and other outstanding Eastern Zone problems have been concluded:
- (b) if so, whether any definite conclusions have been reached; and
  - (c) if so, what are they?

The Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister of External Affairs (Shri Sadath Ali Khan): (a) to (c). An Indo-Pakistan Conference at the official level was held in Calcutta from the 30th September to the 3rd October 1953 to consider these problems. The Conference reached agreement on some of the items discussed. In regard to the other items, it will be necessary to have further consultations.

The decisions reached at the Conference were subject to ratification by the two Governments. The Government of India has ratified them. The ratification of the Government of Pakistan is still awaited. As soon as it is received, an agreed joint communique will be issued simultaneously by the two Governments. A copy of the communique will then be placed on the Table of the House.

Shri S. N. Das: May I know, Sir. whether some political happenings in India have hampered the progress of the negotiations, and the conclusions that were arrived at at the conference have been delayed in ratification?

Shri Sadath Ali Khan: We are not aware of any such thing.

Shri S. N. Das: May I know, Sir, what are the reasons for so much time being taken by the Government of Pakistan to give effect to the exchange of enclaves when this was agreed to by the Prime Ministers of both countries?

The Prime Minister (Shri Jawaharlal Nehru): The principle is recepted by both the countries. But the details were not agreed to. There has been no agreement in regard to those details.

Shri Barman: May I know, Sir, whether any agreement has been reached about the enchaves, and if not, what are the points of disagreement in this respect?

Shri Jawahartal Nehru: I have just stated that an agreement that the enclaves should be exchangd was arrived at in principle. But on what terms, that is to say, whether there should be any land compensation to the side which gives more land or whether there should be any other type of compensation—those questions remain to be settled.

Shri S. N. Das: May 1 know. Sir, whether at the conference that was held at Calcutta the terms and conditions of exchange were finalised?

Shri Jawaharlal Nehru: No.
