EVACUEE SAVINGS BANK ACCOUNTS

\*1147. Sardar Hukam Singh: Will the Minister of Communications be pleased to state:

- (a) whether Government are aware of the statement of the Pakistar. Minister of Communications, reported to have been made in Pakistan Parliament on the 28th September, 1953 to the effect "that negotiations had taken place between India and Pakistan on the question of verification of Savings Bank Accounts and Savings Certificates Claims and that actual work of transfer would begin as soon as liaison officers had been appointed on both sides"; and
- (b) if so, whether Government have appointed the officers for the purpose?

The Minister of Communications (Shri Jaglivan Ram): (a) and (b). Negotiations have taken place and the question of appointment of Liaison Officers is under the consideration of the Government.

Sardar Hukam Singh: May I know whether any conference is fixed for this business just early in the future? 612 PSD. I452

Shri Jagjivan Ram: I trink these officers are going to be appointed shortly.

Sardar Hukam Singh: May I know whether any assessment has been made so far of the value of the amount held by Indians and those held by Pakistanis?

Shri Jagjivan Ram: Total claims registered, so far as the Indian side is concerned, number 1,45,265 and the amount is Rs. 7,22,05,232. Claims settled number 88,153 and the amount Rs. 4,21,32,135. Pending claims to be settled number 56,682, and the amount involved is Rs. 3,00,73,096. We have no knowledge of the number of claims and amounts registered by Pakistan nationals in that country.

Sardar Hukam Singh: May I know whether any interim relief is to be given to these people?

Shri Jagjivan Ram: As soon as the claims are verified and settled.
