SALT

*384. Dr. Ram Subbag Singh: Will the Minister of Production be pleased to state:

- (a) whether India has got enough markets abroad for its surplus salt;
- (b) the quantity of sult exported so far during 1953?

The Minister of Production (Shri K. C. Reddy): (a) No. The only major importer of Indian salt is Japan.

(b) The quantity exported by sea so far during 1953 is about 62 lakh maunds.

Dr. Ram Subhag Singh: If India has not got enough markets for her salt, are Government trying to find out some more markets elsewhere?

Shri K. C. Erddy: The production of salt in India has gone up in the last two years. The Government of India are exploring through certain Embassies the availability of new markets for salt. The results, I am afraid, have not so far been encouraging. At the same time the Salt Manufacturers' Association and certain enterprising manufacturers also are trying abroad to find new markets for the salt manufactured by them. Anyhow, efforts are being made to increase exports.
