(c) if so, the details thereof;

(d) how much replacement of existing tonnage is likely to be required;

(c) whether the Government have worked out the financial requirements, and (f) if so, the details thereof?

THE MINISTER OF STATE OF THE MINISTRY OF SURFACE TRANSPORT (SHRI JAGDISH TY-TLER): (a) The policy of the Government is to encourage acquisition of new ships, keeping in view the requirement of tonnage to meet the transport needs of the country's sca. borne trade and the need to support Indian Shipyards.

(b) to (f) The Planning Group on Shipping set up by Planning Commission estimated in 1987 the tonnage required to be acquired by 2000 A.D. and the corresponding investment required at the prevalent exchange rates to be made to finance this acquisition on the basis of four scenarios. The details are given below:—
