tions to visit India in the last week of November so as to acquaint them with the capabilities that have been developed in the fields of engineering, consultancy, civil engineering, and construction, and our capacity to export manufactured goods of quality.

- (c) To the extent to which these will help bridge the information and knowledge gap of foreign businessmen, Government has no objection to such visits.
- (d) Government's policy towards foreign investment continues to be highly selective and aims at filling technological gaps and expanding exports. Therefore, foreign investment is allowed where the technology to be imported is highly sophisticated or has not been developed indigenously.
