## Encouraging mass transport system in order to discourage use of Private vehicles for Saving Petrol

Written Answers

- 4533. SHRI BHARAT SINGH: Will the Minister of SHIPPING AND TRANS-PORT be pleased to state:
- (a) the estimated operational cost per kilometre in the case of motor car and two-wheeler in India and how much petrol per annum is expected to be consumed by them;
- (b) the measures which are being taken to encourage the mass transport system in order to discourage the use of private vehicles;
- (c) whether any survey has been carried out in this regard; and
- (d) if so, the findings thereof and the reaction of the Government thereto?

THE MINISTER OF STATE FOR SHIPPING AND TRANSPORT (SHRI Z.R. ANSARI): (a) According to the Petroleum Conservation Research Association the estimated per kilometre operational cost of motor car and two-wheeler is Rs. 1.68 and Rs. 0 40, respectively. The consumption of motor gaseline for cars (including taxis) during 1985-86 is estimated at 9,80,000 tonnes. Estimated fuel consumption in respect of two-wheelers is 6,48,000 tonnes.

(b) to (d). Suburban rail system in Bombay, Madras, and Calcutta, metroproject in Calcutta, Electrical Multiple Unit (EMU) services in Delhi are the schemes designed to provide mass rapid transit systems. The executive responsibility for road transport is vested in the State Governments. The need for providing an efficient and adequate public transportation system has been impressed upon them.

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH (SHRI YO-GENDRA MAKWANA): (a) and (b). No, Sir. With the advent of potent anti-TB drugs the domiciliary treatment of TB patients is as effective as the treatment in TB hospitals/sanatoria. Only a few selected groups of patients who are seriously sick and suffering from some complications or needing surgery are admitted in T.B. hospitals sanatoria.
