

OBNOXIOUS TELEPHONE CALLS

***207. Shri Krishnacharya Joshi:** Will the Minister of Communications be pleased to state:

(a) whether the public have made repeated complaints, regarding the nuisance of obnoxious telephone calls in the city of Hyderabad; and

(b) if so, are Government taking the necessary steps to prevent the same?

The Deputy Minister of Communications (Shri Raj Bahadur): (a) Yes, 39 such complaints were received during the year 1953.

(b) Yes. Observation checks were employed on receipt of such complaints and it was possible to eliminate this nuisance to a very large extent.

Shri Krishnacharya Joshi: May I know, Sir, in how many cases the mischief-maker was detected in 1953?

Shri Raj Bahadur: Thirty-one cases have been detected where the Department was able to trace out those telephones from which obnoxious calls were being made.

Shri Krishnacharya Joshi: May I know what punishment was given to the mischief-makers?

Shri Raj Bahadur: They have been warned in the first instance, and after the warning, which had a salutary effect, no further action was considered necessary.

RESEARCH CENTRE FOR MENTAL AILMENT

***208. Dr. Ram Subhag Singh:** Will the Minister of Health be pleased to state:

(a) whether Government propose to establish a well equipped centre for research in mental ailments; and

(b) if so, where that centre is proposed to be established and at what cost?

The Deputy Minister of Health (Shrimati Chandrasekhar): (a) Yes.

(b) the Centre, which is to be called the All-India Mental Health Institute, is to be established at Bangalore. The total cost of the Institute is Rs. 7.3 lakhs, non-recurring, and Rs. 1.365 lakhs, recurring, besides the local cost of W. H. O. experts, for a short period.

Dr. Ram Subhag Singh: May I know, Sir, whether the entire cost of the Centre will be borne by the Government of India, or will the Government of India get assistance from any other quarter?

Shrimati Chandrasekhar: The recurring cost will be Rs. 1,365 lakhs, which is the Government of India's share.

Mr. Speaker: That is the only recurring cost?

Dr. Ram Subhag Singh: May I know whether the Government of India is going to receive any assistance for the starting or opening of the Centre from any other quarter, or will it meet the entire expenditure itself?

Shrimati Chandrasekhar: The Government of Mysore have given Rs. 4.7 lakhs towards the extension of the existing building, and Rs. 80,000 for the equipment.

Shri B. S. Murthy: May I know, Sir, whether Government are contemplating any technical assistance from abroad?

The Minister of Health (Rajkumari Amrit Kaur): The Superintendent of the Institute will look after the Central Government Institute as well as the local Institute.

STOCK OF FOODGRAINS

***209. Shri S. C. Singhal:** Will the Minister of Food and Agriculture be pleased to state:

(a) the stock of foodgrains with the Central Government at present; and

(b) the average cost price per maund of each foodgrain?

The Deputy Minister of Food and Agriculture (Shri M. V. Krishnappa): (a) The stocks of foodgrains with the Central Government on 6th February, 1954 amounted to 438,000 tons approximately.

(b) The accounts for 1953-54 have not yet been finalised and the precise actual cost of each grain in the Central Reserve Depots is not yet available. The present issue prices of foodgrains from Central Reserve Depots which are based on the approximate book values are, however, Rs. 30/8/- per md. for 'A' grade rice; Rs. 15/8/- per md. for wheat and Rs. 12/- per md. for milo.

Shri Mohiuddin: May I know, Sir, what percentage of the foodgrains has deteriorated and what quantity has been placed in what is called 'C' and 'D' grades?

Shri M. V. Krishnappa: I require notice for the question.

Shri N. L. Joshi: May I know whether the cost price is higher than the cost at which foodgrains are available in the country in the open market?

The Minister of Food and Agriculture (Shri Kidwai): The issue price of wheat is Rs. 15-8-0 a maund; the market quotations in U. P. and Punjab are in some places a little higher and in some places a little lower.

NATIONAL HIGHWAYS

*210. **Shri N. M. Lingam:** Will the Minister of Transport be pleased to state the mileage of National Highways with water-bound macadamised surface in India?

The Deputy Minister of Railways and Transport (Shri Alagesan): 5,600 miles.

Shri N. M. Lingam: May I know, Sir, the length of National Highways which have cement concrete surface and asphaltic surface?

Shri Alagesan: 4,150 miles are either concrete or black top surface.

Shri N. M. Lingam: May I know, Sir, if it is the policy of the Government of India to upgrade the present macadamised surface into asphaltic surface or concrete surface?

Shri Alagesan: Yes, Sir.

Shri N. M. Lingam: May I know if the rainfall of the localities and strategic considerations are taken into account in choosing the regions for cement concreting?

Shri Alagesan: Yes, Sir, but I do not know about the strategic aspect of it. Certainly the other aspect is taken into consideration.

Shrimati Kamlendu Mati Shah: How many miles of national highways have been, or are proposed to be, taken up this year?

Shri Alagesan: The question covers the entire National Highway system. It is being done on a programmed basis and most of it will be completed before the Five Year Plan period is over.

ALL INDIA WOMEN'S FOOD COUNCIL

*211. **Shri K. P. Sinha:** Will the Minister of Food and Agriculture be pleased to state:

(a) whether the All-India Women's Food Council at its third annual conference made a demand that this body be recognised as an autonomous body;

(b) the total amount of grant given by Government to this institution annually; and

(c) the grant now demanded by it?

The Deputy Minister of Food and Agriculture (Shri M. V. Krishnappa):

(a) Yes.
