The Minister of Commerce and Industry and Iron and Steel (Shri T. T. Krishnamachari): (a) Yes, a 'Handloom Week' was celebrated from the 19th to 25th February, 1956.

(b) All States except Jammu and Kashmir participated in the celebrations.

PARLIAMENT HOUSE

. 540. Shri Veeraswamy: Will the Minister of Works, Housing and Supply be pleased to state:

(a) whether Government are aware that the premises round the Parliament House and the approach roads are not kept clean and tidy;

(b) whether there is any arrangement to keep the premises of and the approach roads to the Parliament House and the Central Secretariat Buildings clean and hygienic; and

REPORTS OF THE INDIAN CONSULATE-GENERAL AT SAN FRANCISCO AND NEW YORK

The Minister of Commerce and Industry and Iron and Steel (Shri T. T. Krishnamachari): (a) The report from San Francisco was received in July 1953 and that from New York in November, 1953. The substance of these reports was published in the columns of the Journal of Industry and Trade within one month of their receipt. Owing to the inadequacy of staff, the two reports could not be consolidated and prepared for the Press until the middle of 1954. Because of the pressure of more urgent demand on the Government printing presses, final printed copies were made available for distribution only in the month of February, 1956.
