(d) the sections under each sub-Division with its jurisdiction?

The Minister of Works, Housing and Supply (Shri K. C. Reddy): (a) to (c). A statement showing the names of circles, Divisions and sub-Divisions with their headquarters is laid on the Table. [See Appendix I, annexure No. 7].

Tibetan Refugees

Will the Prime Minister be pleased to state:

(a) the amount of money which has been spent up to date on Dalai Lama and his party in India;

(b) the amount of money which has been spent up to date for the rehabilitation of the Tibetan refugees in the different camps in India; and

(c) the total number of Tibetan refugees who have left the camps by now?

The Prime Minister and Minister of External Affairs (Shri Jawaharlal Nehru): (a) Rs. 5,80,368 has been spent on the Dalai Lama and his party upto the end of September, 1960.

(b) Rs. 51,87,196 has been spent on the relief and rehabilitation of the Tibetan refugees.

(c) 17,012 Tibetan refugees have left Transit Camps for employment purposes.

Production of Cement

5. **Shri D. C. Sharma:** Will the Minister of Commerce and Industry be pleased to state whether the targets fixed for the production of cement during the Second Five Year Plan have been achieved?

The Minister of Industry (Shri Manubhai Shah): The total industrial capacity approved/licensed so far for the production of cement in the country comes to 15 million tons against the target of 16 million tons fixed for the Second Five Year Plan, which was later on considered for implementation at 10 million tons. During the middle of 1958, the demand for cement showed a tendency to lag behind production and therefore, it was considered necessary to go slow with the implementation of licensed capacity. The capacity expected to materialise by the end of the Plan period is 9.57 million tons.

Tibetan Refugee Educational Institution, Mussoorie
