Soviet credit for Super Thermal Station

1040. SHRI B. V. DESAI: Will Minister of FINANCE be pleased to state:

- (a) whether differences have cropped up over the credit terms between India and the Soviet Union for setting up a Super Thermal Station;
- (b) if so, whether the main reasons for the difference is that the Soviet Union is contemplating tightening of credit terms including raising of interest rates and lowering of payment period;
- (c) what is India's point of view in this regard;
- (d) whether a high level Soviet delegation visited India during December, 1982. to discuss the terms with the Union Government and no formal decision arrived at;

- (e) whether a technical team from Russia visited the site;
- (f) whether the Russian technical team has stated that both Energy and Finance Ministry are not keen on the Soviet credit for the power projects at the revised terms; and
- (g) by what time the final decision is likely to be taken?

THE MINISTER OF **FINANCE** (SHRI PRANAB MUKHERJEE): (a) to (g) Vindhyachal Thermal Power Station, which is presently under construction with Soviet cooperation, is being financed under the Soviet Credit of Roubles 520 million dated 10-12-1980. The Credit is repayable over a period of 20 years, inclusive of a grace period of 3 years, along with inper cent per terest at the rate of $2\frac{1}{2}$ annum. The possibility of setting up further Thermal Power Projects with Soviet cooperation is under consideration Prelimi-

nary discussions in this regard were held during the Indo-Soviet Working Meeting on Power held in New Delhi in December, 1982 and during the visit to India of Dr. V. I. Litvinenko, Deputy Chairman of the State Committee Foreign Economic Relations of the USSR also in December, 1982. Since the discussions are still in a very preliminary stage, it will not be possible to anticipate outcome of the discussions or to state when the final decision will be reached in the matter.

(b) On account of severe recession in the world steel industry, the demand for iron ore is falling. Efforts are being made to diversify markets for our iron ore exports.
