Opening of Bangla Desh Mission in New Delhi

Written Answers

758. SHRI P. GANGADEB: Will the Minister of EXTIRNAL AFFAIRS be pleased to state.

- (a) whether a Bangla Desh Mission has been formally opened in New Delhi with the hoisting of its national flag; and
- (b) if so, Government's reaction thereto?

THE DEPUTY MINISTER IN THE MINISTRY OF FXTERNAL AFFAIRS (SHRI SURENDRA PAL SINGH): (a) Yes. Sir.

(b) Government's attitude flows from their policy on the question of recognition of Bangla Desh, a decision on which will be taken at the appropriate time.

Raising of Issue of Bangla Desh in U. N. O.

- 759 SHRI P. GANGADEB: Will the Minister of EXTERNAL AFFAIRS be pleased to state:
- (a) whether India raised the question of Bangla Desh in U. N. O.,
- (b) if so, to what extent India got the support of other countries;
- (c) how many countries participated in favour of India's move; and
- (d) whether some other countries also put forward any proposal in this regard?

THE DEPUTY MINISTER IN THE MINISTRY OF EXTERNAL AFFAIRS (SHRI SURENDRA PAL SINGH): (a) Yes, Sir. The Delegation of India raised the Bangla Desh issue during the general debate in the U. N. General Assembly and continues to do so in various Committees of the Assembly as appropriate.

- (b) and (c). There is general consensus among the members of the U. N. that:
 - (i) the situation in East Bengal is the legitimate concern of the international community because it is a disaster of vast proportions involving an unprecedented migration of a large number of nationals of one member of the U. N. into another;
 - (ii) a solution for the problem of East

- Bengal can be achieved not by military means but only by political means which would take into account the welfare and wishes of the people of East Bengal;
- (iii) the international community should endeavour to bring about such a solution, and that special efforts should be made to alleviate the sufferings of the refugees;
- (iv) there has been a large scale influx of refugees from East Bengal into India that they will only return to their homelands when assured of credible guarantees for their safety and honour.

Out of the 117 delegations which participated in the General Debate, 55 made specific references to the developments in East Bengal on the above lines.

(d) No formal proposal was put forward by any country for the solution of the problem though a few suggested mediation good offices, and visit by a contact group of the U. N. to both India and Pakistan. The Indian delegation firmly resisted such suggestions pointing out that proposals for the solution of the problem equating India and Pakistan would not resolve the basic cause of the ferment in East Bangal. The India delegation stated that only proposals aimed at stopping the Military repression in Fast Bengal and restoring the fundamental rights and liberties of the people of East Bengal would be conducive to a lasting solution. There was general appreciation for the validity of this approach to the problem.

Reduction of Administration Charges by Central Board of Trustees of Provident Fund

THE MINISTER OF LABOUR AND REHABILITATION (SHRI R.K. KHADIL-KAR). (a) and (b). In the beginning, the rate of administrative charges was fixed at 3 per cent of both the shares of contribution when the statutory rate of provident fund contribution was (a), 61 per cent of pay From January, 1963 the statutory rate of contributton in recoect of certain industries was enhanced to 8 per cent of pay. The rate of administrative charges in respect establishments which were required to pay contributions (11 8 per cent was fixed at 2,40 per cent of both the shares of provident fund contributions which was equivalent to 3 per cent of both shares of contributions (a) 61 per cent As these two rates of administrative charges created additional work allround, it was uniformly fixed at 0.37 per cent of pay.
