unit provided the identification is based on the relevant statistical data of regional development.

Proposals of State Governments for accele ated development of mackedly backward areas within State boundaries will form part of the State's draft Fourth Five Year Plans and will be duly considered.

Backward Areas in Madras State

4180. Shri Umanath: Will the Minister of Planning and Social Welfare be pleased to state:

- (a) whether it is a fact that the Government of Madras have appoached the Centre with proposals to enable it to identify backward areas confined to Taluks in a district;
 - (b) if so, the details thereof;
- (c) the date on which the proposal was made;
- (d) if not, whether any other proposals have been made by the Madras Gove nment regarding identification of backward areas in Madras State; and
- (e) if so, the details thereof an the decision taken thereon?

The Deputy Minister in the Minist y of Finance (Shri L. N. Mishra): (a) to (e). There has been some correspondence between the Planning Commission and the Government of Madras regarding the unit of administration on which the backward areas in the State should be identified. The Government of Mad as agreed to analyse the statistical date District-wise and to furnish the information called for in Planning Commission's letter of January 1965 1egarding Identification of backward areas with seleted indicators of regional development.

Aid from Abroad

4181. Shri Firodia: Will the Minister of Finance be pleased to state:

(a) whether Government have received any offer of financial aid from the small countries of Europe, Asia and Latin America; and (b) if so, in what particular industry this aid is likely to be utilised?

The Minister of Finance (Shrl Sachindra Chaudhuri): (a) Therehave recently been offers of financial aid from the undermentioned count. ies:

- (i) Hungary
- (ii) Yugos!avia, and
- (iii) Sweden.
- (1 The use of this aid for individual industries is yet under examination

Increase in Population

4182. Shri P. C. Borovah: Wi'l the Minister of Health and Famly Planning be pleased to state:

- (a) whether Government's attention has been drawn to a survey recently released by the World Health Organisation revealing that the population of Delhi has doubled and that of Bombay troubled during the two decades:
- (b) if so, what are the World Health O ganisation's figures regarding the increase in the population of other principal cities/towns of India;
- (c) how far Government's information agrees with it; and
- (d) how far this population increase is att ibutable to immigration from Pakistan and elsewhere?

The Minister of Health and Family Planning (Dr. Sushila Nayar): (a) Yes. The Government of India is aware only of a Press release made on -4-1966 in connection with the World Health Day on 7-4-1966 by the Regional Office for Scuth East Asia of the World Health Organisation at New Delhi, stating that the population of Delhi had doubled and that of Bornbay trebled between 1940—1960.

(b) No mention has been made in the W.H.O. Press release about the increase in population of other princibal cities/towns of India.
