(a),(b) & (c): Five day week system introduced in June 1985 without reduction in the weekly working hours as under six day week, was reviewed through study conducted by the Department of Administrative Reforms in February, 1987 and November, 1988 and was recommended for continuance. On a further review in the light of the recommendations of the 5th Central PayCommission, Government Departments whose functions are pre-dominantly marked by public dealings or of commercial nature have been advised to review the existing arrangement and switch over to six day week working wherever feasible.
