## Will the Minister of CONSUMER AFFAIRS, FOOD AND PUBLIC DISTRIBUTION be pleased to state:

- (a) whether the Government have decided to sell wheat for export at a highly subsidised rates because traders have offered more prices per tonne in the latest tender;
- (b) if so, whether the Commerce Ministry have advised the Ministry of Food that a speciallow price for export would be WTP-incompatible under WTO;
- (c) if so, whether under the WTO, no Government can sell a commodity for export at prices lower than those for the domestic market;
- (d) whether according to the reports, more than 3.5 lakh tonne is still stocked at ports awaiting shipment;
- (e) if so, whether the Government have taken any firm policy regarding export of wheat;
- (f) if so, the details thereof; and
- (g) if not, by what time it is likely to be declared?

## **Answer**

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF CONSUMER AFFAIRS, FOOD AND PUBLIC DISTRIBUTION (SHRI CHAUHAN)

- (a): The price of wheat for export has to be competitive with the international price to facilitate export of wheat. FCI has been permitted to offer wheat for export at a price not less than the CIP of wheat for the BPL category.
- (b): No, Sir.
- (c): No, Sir.
- (d): a quantity of 1.85 lakh tonnes of wheat is lying in port godowns for export purposes.
- (e),(f)&(g): As per the EXIM Policy, export of wheat is allowed freely subject to quantitative ceilings announced by DGFT and issue of Registration cum Allocation Certificates (RCACs) by APEDAFor the year 2001-02, an export ceiling of 5 million MTs of wheat has been announced.
