- (a) whether the Government have done evaluation of District Primary Education Programme (DPEP);
- (b) if so, the details thereof;
- (c) the total amount allocated, disbursed and spent on DPEP during each of the last three years, as on date, State-wise;
- (d) the total amount utilised for appointment of teachers under DPEP, State-wise;
- (e) whether the Government propose to allocate more funds under the said programme; and
- (f) if so, the details thereof, State-wise?

# Answer

STATEMENT REFERRED TO IN REPLY TO PARTS (a) T(D) OF THE LOK SABHA STARRED QUESTION NO.214 ASKED SHRIV. VETRISELVAN & SHRI BASUDEB ACHARIA FOR ANSWER ON 4.12.2001 REGARDING `EVALUATION PROGRAMME`

(a) & (b): Since the District PrimaryEducation Programme (DPEP)was introduced/expanded in various States/districts in different phases, the final evaluation of the programme will be undertaken based on the closing dates of various projects. At present, external evaluation of DPEPphase-I, comprising the States of Assam, Kerala, Karnataka, Haryana, Madhya Pradesh, Chhattisgarh, Maharashtra and Tamil Nadu is being done through the Indian Institutes of Management (IIMs), at Bangalore, Kolkata, Lucknow and Ahmedabad.

The programme is, however, periodically reviewed through the mechanism of Joint Review Missions, Project Management Information System (PMIS), Educational Management Information System (EMIS), programmempact studies etc. A mid-term In-depth Review of DPEP Phase- I,II and IIIStates have also been carrried out. Reviews and various studies conducted from time to time have brought out that the programme has resulted in significant increase in enrolment, improvement in learning achievements, reduction in repetition rates, increased community involvement, improvements in class- room processes etc.

- (c) No State-wise budgetary allocations are made under the programme. The position indicating the funds released by the Government of India to the various project States and expenditure incurred during the last three years is given at Annex. I.
- (d) The total amount utilised for appointment of teachers under DPEP by the various project States is given Annex.II.
- (e) & (f): Funds are released to the State Implementation Societies based on the approved project outlay and the Annual Work Plan & Budget approved during the year. The concerned project States are required to contribute 15% of the total project cost. A statement indicating the State-wise approved project cost, funds released by the Government of India upto 31.3.2001, and approved Annual Work Plan & Budget for the year 2001-02 is given at Annex III.

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#### Annex - II

#### Major Achievements of DPEP

- (1) About 21,000 new schools have been opened. Besides, 67,000 Alternative Schools have also been opened in unserved habitations under DPEP covering about 24.60 lakhs children.
- (2) Enrolment in DPEP-I districts has increased from 79.33 lakhs in 1997-98 to 80.36 lakhs in 2000-01. In DPEP-II/III districts, for which the data is available, the overall enrolment has increased from 185.31 lakhs in 1997-98 to 206.94 lakhs in 2000-01.
- (3) About 37,000 school buildings, 36,000 additional classrooms, 12,000 resource centres, 11,000 repair works, 34,000 toilets and 15,000 drinking water facilities have been completed or near in completion in DPEP districts.
- (4) Despite the increase in enrolments over the years, the average Student Class Ratio(SCR) for phase-I districts has declined from 42 in 1995-96 to 38.8 in 2000-01. Similarly, the SCR for Phase II/III districts for which the data is available, has declined from 52 in 1996-97 to 50.5 in 2000-01.
- (5) The Gross Enrolment Ratio (GER) for Phase-I states was around 93 to 95 percent for the last three yearsThe GER has marginally declined to 92.5 percent in 2000-01. After the adjustment for the AS/EGS enrolment, the GER in 2000-01 comes to 98.2 percentln DPEP-II/III districts, the GER including enrolment of AS/EGS continued to remain at 85 percent.
- (6) According to the Access and Retention studies, there has been a significant decline in average Repetition Rate (RR) for Phase-I states till 1998/99. Overall, the Repetition Ratefor Phase-I states has shown a marginal decline from 6.5 percent to 6.3 percent between 1998/99 and 1999/2000. The overall decline in Repetition Rate in DPEP-II states has declined from 9 percent in 1997/98 to 8.1 percent in 1999/2000.
- (7) A study to estimate the dropout rate from the EMIS data on enrolment and repeaters for the years 1999/2000 and 2000/2001, was carried out for 102 DPEP districts of 13 DPEP states using the Reconstructed and Apparent Cohort methods. The percentage of children who drop out between grade-I and the last grade of primary school was found to be less than 10% in 13% of the districts and less than 20% in one-third of the districts. An encouraging finding was that the gender gap reduced to less than 5 percentage points in 72% districts, but the high dropout rate in a large number of districts is still a matter of concern.
- (8) In Phase-I there were 21 districts where the Index of Gender Equity (IGE) was less than 95 in 1995-96. Now the number of such districts is eight. In Phase-II/III districts, in 51 of 81 districts, IGE exceeds 95.
- (9) So far over 400,000 children with special needs have been identified in the project blocks, out of which 303,000 (76%) have been enrolled in schools under the component of Integrated Education for Disabled Children (IED).

- (10) Village Education Committees/School Management Committees have been set up in almost all project villages/habitations/schools.
- (11) About 94,000 teachers, including para-teachers / Shiksha Karmis have been appointed.
- (12) As per mid-term assessment survey on learning achievement , the overall performance level has crossed 60% mark in 44 districts in language and 51 districts in mathematics in class I.
- (13) Pedagogical interventions under DPEP with their focus on child centred activities has led to considerable improvement in quality of education.
