- (a) The information is given in the statement enclosed herewith.
- (b) & (c) It is Government's constant endeavour to contain non-plan, non- developmental expenditure. It is in this context that Ministry of Finance, Department of Expenditure, apart from taking other measures, issues instructions and guidelines, from time to time, to all the Ministries/ Departments in the Government of India, to avoid wasteful expenditure and for expenditure management and fiscal prudence. These measures include ban on the creation of posts, reduction in the number of sanctioned posts, restrictions on the filling up of vacant posts, reduction in office expenses, restrictions on purchase of vehicles, restriction on foreign travel and on entertainment/ hospitality expenses restriction on STD/ ISD facility, restriction on number of free calls on official residential telephones, etc.
