Will the Minister of AGRICULTURE be pleased to state:

- (a) whether the Globe's costliest spice saffron is facing a rough very rough weather in Kashmir;
- (b) whether saffron yield has dwindled to merely 10,000 kgs. when about 1,50,000 person are associated with its cultivation and in some areas the production even dropped by 60 per cent; and
- (c) if so, the steps proposed to be taken by the Union Government to increase the production?

Answer

- (a) The Saffron crop in Kashmir Division has suffered heavy loss due to occurrenceof unprecedented drought during the year 1999-2000.
- (b) The average yield of Saffron has increased from 2.62 kg. Per ha. during 1996 to 3.03 kg per ha. in 1998. The total production of Saffron in the region was 12,780 kg. during 1998. The Kishtwar plateau of Jammu Divison has been affected to the extent of5 to 10 per cent due to corm rot disease.
- (c) Govt. of India is implementing Centrally Sponsored Integrated Programme for Development of Spices which includes saffron also. The programmes implemented during the first 3 years of the 9th Plan for increasing production and productivity of Saffron in Jammu & Kashmir are:
- (i) Establishment of Seed Multiplication plots and
- (ii) Demonstration plots. During the remaining period of the 9th Plan, the saffrondevelopment programmes proposed to be implemented are:
- (i) Setting up of corm production centres for augmenting supply of quality seed material and
- (ii) Establishment of demonstration-cum-seed multiplication plots to propagate better farming practices and to encourage area expansion. The 9th Plan outlay earmarked for saffron development in Jammu & Kashmir is Rs.10.50 lakhs.
