(a): Yes, Sir.

(b) & (c): The Infrastructure development projects along the Buddhist circuit in UttarPradesh and Bihar was carried out by undertaking loan assistance of 7.7 billion Japanese Yen from the Overseas Economic Cooperation Fund of Japan (now known as JapanBank for International Cooperation (JBIC)). The project covered Sarnath, Kushinagar, Piprahawa and Sravasti in Uttar Pradesh and Bodhgaya, Nalanda, Rajgir and Vaishali in Bihar. The project was completed at a cost of Rs.251.05 crores in December, 1998

Loan assistance was availed from the Overseas Economic CooperationFund of Japan (now known as Japan Bank for International Cooperation (JBIC)) for theAjanta Ellora Conservation and Tourism Development Project (Phase I)'n Maharashtra. The Overseas Economic Cooperation Fund loan assistance was to the tune of 3745 million Japanese Yen. The project was completed at a cost of Rs.127.50 crores approximately in March, 2002. The places covered were Ajanta and Ellora inMaharashtra. Japan Bank for International Cooperation has agreed in principle to provide loan assistance (Approximately Japanese Yen 7331 million) for Ajanta Ellora Conservation and Tourism Development Project Phase-II.The locations to be covered are: Ajanta, Ellora, Pithalkhora, Aurangabad, Daulatabad, Patnadevi, Lonar, Nasik, Pune, Elephanta caves, Bhaja and Bedsa, Shivneri, Malshej, and Kolvan in Maharashtra.
