(a) the present status of the Government's target to deliver 'Health for All' by the year 2000;

(b) whether the Government have achieved the target;

(c) if so, the details thereof and if not, the reasons therefore; and

(d) the steps taken by the Government to achieve the target to provide `Health for All` by the year 2000?

Answer

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF HEALTH AND FAMILY WELFARE (PROF. RITA VERMA)

(a) to (c) : A statement of achievement against targets indicated in the 1983 National health policy is enclosed (Annexure). The nonachievement of desired levels of success under a few indicators are manifold ranging from poverty, malnutrition, illiteracy, lack of awareness to safe water and sanitation and low status of women etc.

(d) To achieve the goal of `Health for All` by 2000 A.D, a comprehensive network of rural health infrastructure comprising 1,37,006 Sub-centres, 23,179 Primary Health Centres, 2,913 Community Health Centres has been established throughout the country as on 31.12.1998 to provide preventive, promotive and curative health care in rural areas.

Government has been making every effort to augment the resources for the health and family welfare sectors by mobilising external assistance from various bilateral and multilateral agencies for implementing the National Programmes for AIDS, Malaria, T.B., Leprosy, Blindness, Reproductive Child Health Programme.Besides, for upgrading the rural hospitals in selected States, World Bank assistance has been availed of which would further improve delivery of health services.
