I

Introduction

- I, the Chairman of the Committee on Government Assurances having been authorised by the Committee to present the report on their behalf, hereby present this Third Report of the Committee.
- 2. The Committee was nominated by the Speaker on the 1st May, 1964.

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Sitting of the Committee

3. After the presentation of its Second Report (Third Lok Sabha) on the 30th April, 1964, the Committee held four sittings (namely: on the 23rd September, 1964; 18th December, 1964; 9th April, 1965 and 23rd April, 1965). At these sittings, the Committee considered the nature and extent of implementation of a number of assurances. The Committee also scrutinized the reasons for the delay in implementation of the pending assurances which were referred to it by the corresponding Committee of the Second Lok Sabha and also reviewed the assurances given during the Fifth, Sixth, Seventh, Eighth and the Ninth Sessions of the Third Lok Sabha. The relevant Minutes of the sittings of the Committee were laid on the Table of the House on the 29th September, 1964, 23rd December, 1964, 19th and 27th April, 1965.

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Implementation of Assurances

4. The Committee expressed satisfaction that the progress of implementation of assurances had shown further improvement. The Committee noted that while during the First to the Ninth Sessions of the Second Lok Sabha, out of 2,536 assurances, 2,174 had been implemented (i.e. 85.8 per cent) leaving a balance of 362, during the corresponding period of the present Lok Sabha, out of 1884 assurances given, 1,714 had been implemented (i.e. 90.9 per cent) leaving a balance of only 170. This recorded a slight improvement.

The Committee perused the analytical statement (Appendix I) showing the time taken by various Ministries in implementing the assurances vide statements laid on the Table by the Minister of Parliamentary Affairs from time to time and noted that out of a total of 393 assurances 102 had been implemented within two months, 190 in two to six months while the remaining in more than six months. The Committee were of the view that there were certain assurances, though small in number in regard to which it should not have been difficult to collect the requisite information more

particularly those relating to the subjects which were directly the concern of the Central Government. Such assurances should have been implemented within two months. The Committee also reiterated their earlier view that if the implementation of assurances was delayed beyond a reasonable time, they lost their value and public interest and the whole idea of implementation of assurances was defeated. The Committee accordingly desired that energetic steps might be taken by Government to implement the assurances which are pending for long.

IV

Statistics of pending assurances pertaining to Third Lok Sabha

5. A statement showing the statistics regarding implementation of assurances pertaining to the First to Tenth Sessions of the Third Lok Sabha is appended to this Report (Appendix II). Another statement showing the assurances (Ministry-wise) pertaining to the First to Sixth Sessions of the Third Lok Sabha which have not yet been implemented is appended as Appendix III.

V

Pending assurances pertaining to the Second Lok Sabha

6. In their Second Report, the Committee had appended a list of 14 pending assurances pertaining to the Second Lok Sabha. Out of these, nine have since been implemented and one was dropped by the Committee. At their sittings held on the 23rd September and 18th December, 1964, the Committee accepted the reasons justifying the delay in the implementation of the remaining four assurances (Appendix IV). As sufficient time had since elapsed, the Committee were of the opinion that Government might take early steps to implement these assurances.
