AUTO LIFTING CASES
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Will the Minister of HOME AFFAIRS be pleased to state:

- (a) whether cases of auto lifting are on the rise in the NCT of Delhi;
- (b) if so, the total number of such cases reported during each of the last three years and the current year;
- (c) the details of the modus operandi; and
- (d) the steps taken by the Delhi Police to curb such cases in future?

Answer

MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF HOME AFFAIRS (SHRI MULLAPPALLY RAMACHANDRAN)

(a) to (d): Yes, Madam. There has been an increase in the number of auto-lifting cases. Details for the last three years 2007, 2008 & 2009 and 2010 (upto 31.01.2010) are as under:-

But taking into account the phenomenal increase in the vehicle population in NCT of Delhi, when computed in terms of per lakh of vehicle population, such auto-lifting cases have, in fact, shown a declining trend, having come down from 195.84 in the year 2008 to 190.9 in the year 2009.

Gangs of Auto-lifters are known to use different modus operandi to commit auto thefts. However, using duplicate/master-keys and breaking open the locks/glasses of the Motor Vehicles are the most common modus operandi. Delhi Police has stepped-up the preventive efforts to check auto thefts and there is a focused drive to nab the gangs of auto-lifters. Action initiated by the Delhi Police are as follows:-

- 1. Identification of affected places and time zone and proper deployment of staff in these areas.
- 2. STAs requested not to register second hand vehicles without receiving NOC from the concerned authority.
- 3. Manufacturers requested to install security devices at the factory/show room.
- 4. Record of stolen vehicles has been computerized.
- 5. Parking attendants sensitized.
- 6. Co-ordination with Insurance Agencies.
- 7. Co-ordination meetings are periodically held with the police of the neighbouring states.
- 8. There is a sustained drive to identify and nab gangs of auto-lifters operating in Delhi.
- 9. Distribution of educative literature on preventive measures.
- 10. Educative advertisements in newspapers, FM Channel etc.
- 11. Barriers/"naka" in affected and vulnerable areas.
