STATEMENT REFERRED IN REPLY TO PARTS (a) TO (d) OF LOK SABHA STARRED QUESTION NO.236 FOR 10.08.2010 REGARDING DEMAND AND SUPPLY OF PULSES.

- (a) & (b): Yes Madam. Government had assessed the average annual increase in the demand, supply and price of pulses in the country. Domestic production of pulses has been around 14 -14.8 million tonnes during the last three years. The Working Group of XI th Five Year Plan of the Planning Commission has estimated that the demand for pulses was around 17- 18 MTs during the same period. The details of the average annual increase in the demand, supply and price of pulses in the country is given in Annexure I.
- (c): The total quantity and value of pulses imported/exported as per the DGCIS data is given in the table below:

(d): India is the largest producer of pulses in the world, but is not self- sufficient in pulses. About 12-15% of the total pulses requirements are imported. India has been a net importer of pulses due to a mismatch between domestic supply and demand for pulses. The gap between demand and supply is filled by import of variety of pulses from different countries depending upon their availability. International prices of pulses surged during the last two years consequently impacting domestic prices also. International prices of pulses over the last two years are given in the Annexure II.
