TECHNICAL SNAGS IN SRINAGAR DELHI FLIGHT

## Will the Minister of CIVIL AVIATION be pleased to state:

- (a) whether there is any recent instance of faulty air-conditioning and non¬ functional auxiliary units in Air India's Airbus A-320 thereby causing inconvenience to the passengers of Srinagar-Delhi flight;
- (b) if so, the details thereof;
- (c) whether the Government has ordered an inquiry into the incident and if so, the details thereof along with its findings; and
- (d) the measures taken or being taken by Air India to prevent recurrence of such incidents in future?

## **Answer**

Minister of State in the Ministry of CIVIL AVIATION (Shri G. M. Siddeshwara)

(a) and (b): Yes, Madam, Air India flight AI-1822 (Srinagar-Jammu-Delhi) operated on 27th June, 2014 by A-320 aircraft VT-EPG had unserviceable Auxiliary Power Unit (APU) due to which air-conditioning was not available on ground. Also, out of the two air-conditioning units available on aircraft, one unit developed a snag. However, the second unit was functioning and air-conditioning was available during the flight. As per manufacturer guidelines, one air-conditioning unit is sufficient for safe aircraft operation. On arrival at Delhi, the faulty air-conditioning unit and auxiliary unit were repaired.

- (c); No, Madam. Such technical snag are handled by the airline itself
- (d); Each defect/delay is analysed and investigated on daily basis by Maintenance and Quality Department of Air India and corrective actions as recommended are taken.
