Water Mills

*308. PROF. RITA VERMA: Will the PRIME MINISTER be please to state:

- (a) the number of water mills set up under the Promotional Incentive Scheme as on March 31, 1998 in the country, State-wise;
- (b) the expenditure incurred thereon and the installed capacity thereof;
- (c) whether these water mills are functional and generating power as per their installed capacity;
 - (d) if not, the reasons therefor;
- (e) the number of such water mills which have been closed down and the reasons for these closure; and
- (f) the details of work done for setting up water mills in private sector?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF RAILWAYS, MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF PARLIAMENTARY AFFAIRS AND MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF PLANNING AND PROGRAMME IMPLEMENTATION (SHRI RAM NAIK):

(a) Ministry of Non-conventional Energy sources has two programmes for development/up-gradation of water mills:—

- (i) Demonstration Programme under UNDP/GEF Hilly Hydro Project.
- (ii) Promotional incentive scheme, 1997.

So far, 17 demonstration water mills have been set up/up-graded in Uttar Pradesh (13 Nos.); Himachal Pradesh (2 Nos.) and Jammu & Kashmir (2 Nos.).

- (b) and (c) Expenditure of about Rs. 4 lakhs has been incurred by the Ministry. 16 water mills are operating at present. Only two are electricity generating water mills which are generating power to capacity of 5 KW each.
- (d) and (e) Only one water mill is temporarily out of order, due to breakage of grinding-stone.
 - (f) All the 17 water mills are in private sector.

Watershed Development Project

*309. SHRI VITHAL TUPE : SHRI GORDHANBHAI JAVIA :

Will the PRIME MINISTER be pleased to state:

- (a) the details of the achievements made under the National Watershed Development Project for Rainfed-Area Scheme, State-wise, particularly in various districts of Maharashtra and Gujarat States during last three years;
- (b) the area of cultivable-land covered under the National Watershed Development Project for Rainfed-Area Scheme (NWDPRA) so far during the above period; and
 - (c) details of the future programme in this regard?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF AGRICULTURE (SHRI SOMPAL): (a) The National Watershed Development Project for Rainfed Areas (NWDPRA) was implemented in 25 States and 2 Union Territories during VIII Plan. Under the Project a Watershed is saturated (fully treated) in a phased manner over a five year period. The Statewise physical achievement of the NWDPRA in the VIII Plan & districtwise in case of Mahasrahtra and Gujarat together with area treated during the 1st year of the IX Plan (1997-98) are given in the enclosed Statements I, II, and III respectively.

(c) NWDPRA is being continued during the IX Five Year Plan in 25 States and 2 Union Territories. The IX Plan outlay for NWDPRA is Rs. 1100 crores. The budget allocation of the Project has been increased from Rs. 155 crore in 1997-98 to Rs. 270 crore in 1998-99. According to a 25 year Perspective Plan prepared by the Planning Commission, Rs. 5000 crore would be required for coverage of rainfed areas through Watershed development, including NWDPRA, during the IX Plan period.

Change in Foreign Policy

*310. SHRI ANUP LAL YADAV: SHRI HARI KEWAL PRASAD :

Will the PRIME MINISTER be pleased to state :

- (a) whether there is any change in the foreign policy of the Government after Pokhran Nuclear tests:
 - (b) if so, the details thereof; and
- (c) the fresh measures taken/proposed to be taken to normalise relations with our neighbouring countries after the nuclear tests?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF EXTERNAL AFFAIRS (SHRIMATI VASUNDHARA RAJE): (a) No. Sir.

- (b) Does not arise.
- (c) In our statements in recent weeks, we have stressed that India is committed to fostering friendship and cooperation with all neighbouring countries. After the tests we have made significant proposals for confidence building and for peace and stability in the region and beyond, including the reiteration of our willingness to discuss a 'no-first-use agreement' bilaterally with Pakistan, as also with other countries, bilaterally or in a collective form. Recently, we addressed an invitation to an official delegation led by Foreign Secretary of Pakistan to visit New Delhi to resume the round of FS-level talks adjourned in New Delhi last September. A letter has also been addressed to the Prime Minister of Pakistan. We have also stated that with China, India seeks a relationship in which both sides are responsive to each other's concerns. The Bangladesh Prime Minister has visited India after the tests and discussions were held on all matters of

mutual interest. Government will continue to remain engaged in substantive dialogue with our neighbours to improve relations and to expand the scope of our interactions in a mutually advantageous manner.

National Policy on Agriculture

*311. SHRI RAMPAL SINGH: SHRI ADITYANATH:

Will the PRIME MINISTER be pleased to state:

- (a) whether the Union government propose to formulate a new national policy on agriculture immediately to increase the production in agriculture sector and in order to solve the problems of the farmers;
 - (b) if so, the details thereof; and
- (c) the time by which the final decision is likely to be taken by the Government in this regard?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF AGRICULTURE (SHRI SOMPAL): (a) to (c) A comprehensive National Policy on Agriculture is in the final stages of drafting and is likely to be finalised shortly in consultation with the States.

The Policy will aim at the management and conservation of the natural-resource base through sustainable management of land and water resources. It will seek to promote environmentally non-degrading, technically sound, economically viable and socially acceptable improvement of natural resources to promote sustainable development of agriculture. The policy will focus particular attention of measures such as Land reforms to channelise the energies of small an marginal farmers.

The policy will, to this end, seek to achieve :

- (i) conservation of the natural-resource base through sustainable management of land and water resources and protection and conservation of bio-diversity.
- (ii) maintenance of food self-sufficiency.
- (iii) greater employment generation, higher household incomes and reduction of poverty through diversification of farming systems.
- (iv) Reduction of regional imbalances through greater emphasis on rainted framing and developing areas of untapped potential;
