- (i) **Need to set-up an Ammonia/urea plant in Andhra Pradesh**

SHRIMATI UMA GAJAPATHI RAJU (Visakhapatnam): Fertiliser is the most crucial input for securing rapid increase in agricultural productivity and providing reasonable return to the farmers. The largest deficit for nitrogenous fertiliser in the southern region is in Andhra Pradesh, and this position is likely to continue for quite some time, unless new capacities are set up. The current deficit in Andhra Pradesh is of the order of about ten lakh tonnes of urea, which justifies the setting up of a Urea plant. In fact, the working group of the Department of
