ORAL ANSWERS TO QUESTIONS

Bombay Textile Workers' Strike

*82. SHRI MOHAMMED ISMAIL : SHRI MADHAVRAO SCINDIA:

Will the Minister of COMMERCE be pleased to state:

- (a) what steps have been taken to settle the prolonged strike of textile workers of Bombay with the representatives of the unions conducting the strike;
- (b) number of mills in which strike is still continuing; and
- (c) what is the estimated loss to the industry, labour and the country, including loss of foreign exchange which could be earned through exports?

THE MINISTER OF COMMERCE AND OF THE DEPARTMENT OF SUPPLY (SHRI VISHWANATH PRATAP SINGH): (a) to (c). A statement is laid on the Table of the House.

Statement

- (a) to (c). The Government of India and the Government of Maharashtra have on many occasions appealed to the striking workers to return to work on the understanding that their genuine problems would be looked into. At the instance of the Government, the millowners have agreed to pay a recoverable advance of Rs. 1,500 per worker and interim relief of Rs. 30 per month. The Government of India have constituted a Tripartite Committee headed by a retired Chief Justice of the Bombay High Court to go into the problems of the workers in the Textile Industry.
- All the textile mills in Bombay have been and continue to be affected in varying degrees by the strike.
