CALLING ATTENTION TO MATTER OF URGENT PUBLIC IMPORTANCE REPORTED STRANDING OF 400 INDIAN SEA-MEN AT BASRAH PORT SINCE OUTBRAK OF IRAN-IRAQ WAR

SHRI RASHEED MASOOD (Sanaran pur): Mr. Speaker, Sir, I call the attention of the Minister of External Affairs to the following matter of urgent public importance and request that he may make a statement thereon:-

"The reported stranding of about 400 Indian crewmen abroad 22 mechanised vessels of India at Basrah port since the outbreak of Iran-Iraq war and the measures taken by the Government to bring them back."

THE MINISTER OF EXTERNAL AFFAIRS (SHRI P. V. NARSIMHA RAO): Sir,

Following the outbreak of the Iran-Iraq conflict on September 22, 1980, three Indian ships and 22 mechanised sailing vessels are presently stranded in the war zone. After earlier evacuations, the number of remaining crewmen presently stranded is 402. In addition, a large number of foreign ships have also been stranded.

The Government of India are fully seized of the problems caused by the stranding of vessels and crewmen in the war zone. The Director General of Shipping has been in touch with the owners of the ships, as well **as** with the All India Sailing Vessels Association, in order to arrange the evacuation of the crewmen. As early as October 7, 1980, the owners of the sailing vessels were advised by the Director General of Shipping to repatriate their crew. Approximately 100 seamen have since been repatriated.

Sir, I am adding to the information that has been sent already in the written statement. This is based on the latest report we got this morning.

We have since received from the Director General of Shipping precise figures of seamen who are stranded and those who have been repatriated from the ports of Basrah and Fao. I had mentioned the figure of repatriated of seamen as approximately 100. The actual figures are as follows: from the more disturbed port known as Fao, 88 crew members pertaining to six sailing vessels that were stranded have already been repatriated. Another 110 members of the crew are now in the process of being repatriated both from Basrah and Fao. The total number of crew members thus either already repatriated or in the process of being repatriated is 198.
