STATEMENT RE. GURU GOBIND SINGH MEDICAL COLLEGE, FARIDABAD

THE MINISTER OF HEALTH AND FAMILY PLANNING (SHRI R. K KHADILKAR): Sir, the House will recall on 22nd March, 1973, 7 made a statement regarding the affairs of the Guru Gobind Singh Medical College, Faridabad. There was another discussion on this subject in this House on 28th March, 1973. On these occasions I gave a detailed account of the factual as well as the formal position. However, in deference to the concern expressed by the Hon. Members during the discussions-which I share-I have been making constant efforts to find a satisfactory solution to this unfortunate situation. I had discussion with the Chief Ministers of Punjab and Haryana as also with other interested persons including some Hon'ble Member of Parliament. I am glad to inform the House that some new ground has been broken and a solution seems at last to be in sight.

The Chief Minister of Punjab whom I met on 20th April, 1973, has stated in his latest communication that he has been assured that the present managing Committee of the college is willing to hand over all the assets to any organisation that would come forward to run the institution. As the State Government of Punjab was already running two medical colleges at Patiala and Amritsar it would not be possible for them alone to take over the entire burden of running the Guru Gobind Singh Medical College after shifting it to a suitable place in Punjab. He is, therefore, considering the constitution of a new Trust which could undertake the work of shifting the college from Faridabad, re-establishing it at some place in Punjab and running it on appropriate lines.
