(5) Bill to repeal the Bombay Co-operative Societies Act, 1925, as applicable to the Union Territory of Delhi and to extend the Punjab Co-operative Societies Act, 1961, with certain modifications to Delhi.

(6) The Foreign Exchange Regulation (Amendment) Bill.

(7) The Constitution (Eighteenth Amendment) Bill.

(8) The Banaras Hindu University (Amendment) Bill.

(9) The Aligarh Muslim University (Amendment) Bill.

32. A statement of Estimated Receipts and Expenditure of the Gov-

ernment of India for the financial year 1964-65 will be laid before you.
